# PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



Dear JNA Members and Friends of Jamaica:

2023 was a busy and significant year for JNA. Our accomplishments were many and are highlighted below in our "Summary of Accomplishments".

As you know, JNA is a 55-year old, 100% volunteer-run, 501(c)(3) nonprofit association. Over the decades, we have experienced "highs" of which we are rightfully proud. However, over those decades, we have also experienced "lows" through which we have persevered as "we come from strong and we "likkle but we talewah".

The COVID pandemic's impacts continued to be felt by JNA and JNA is still in a state of recovery. It left JNA needing to urgently and aggressively rebuild and reignite its membership base, which historically was largely grown and supported through in-person events. The pandemic also left JNA needing to re-connect with its members to encourage them to volunteer, donate and fill leadership positions. This led to changes in JNA's Bylaws that were implemented in February 2023 including allowing for remote elections and other virtual operations. Full recovery will require members to share with JNA what direction they would like JNA to take and what they would like JNA to be.

Our 2023 election signals a new door opening for JNA and I wholeheartedly congratulate JNA's 2024-2025 Executive Committee members. Two major goals of my Administration of which I hope our new Board will continue to focus are the following:

- Increase JNA's membership and outreach, and
- Ensure that Jamaicans in the Washington DC Metropolitan Area know about JNA, what it represents, and what it does.

These goals, however, cannot be achieved without your help. You, your love of Jamaica and your Jamaican heritage are at the heart of JNA and what binds us together.

Our deepest gratitude to the members of the Board of Directors, Advisory Council and Committees, Members, Volunteers, Donors, and Friends who contributed to JNA's success over the years and in 2023. We could not have done it without you.



# **Serving the Needy in the Community**

The continued isolation of the elderly, as a result of the pandemic, created a need for access to necessities such as food and supplies. It also created barriers to social engagement for them, especially since the majority of local churches adapted to the pandemic by conducting online church services. To aid in the response and help bridge the pandemic's impact, JNA's Community Service and Development (CSD) Committee's primary focus supported the elderly and low-income families in the DMV through the following efforts:

- Delivering meals to the community JNA partnered with community-based agencies, faith-based organizations, and food pantries serving the community's most vulnerable people. Since the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic, the CSD Committee and its partners purchased, collected, and helped to deliver over 6,080 meals to the community's most vulnerable.
- Delivering health educational awareness and referral services information to help the elderly — This assisted in their gaining access to needed services; educating them on measures to prevent contracting the virus, such as social distancing and use of the appropriate PPE supplies.
- Distributing books to promote summer reading JNA partnered with the Ebenezer Church of God, in the "Save A City community event" on Saturday, August 12, 2023, collecting and distributing books to promote summer reading by children in low-income communities.

#### JNA's 2023 Black History Month Celebration:

"GO VISITS" During Black History Month 2023

"Get to know African American history within easy access"

February is always an exciting month in the DMV as there are many historical sites in the DMV and it is Black History Month, "a time of the year dedicated to honoring the contributions of African Americans to society both in the US and worldwide." While much of this history has been hidden, February's focus was an opportunity for persons of Jamaican heritage in the DMV to add to their knowledge of the African American leg of the dispersal of peoples of African descent throughout the world, often referred to as the African Diaspora.

For Black History Month 2023, on a weekly basis, JNA shared with its members and friends information on an easily accessible site to visit or activity, which JNA members recommended.

**Week 1:** Harriett Tubman Museum on Maryland's Eastern Shore



For the opening week of Black History Month, JNA featured the Harriett Tubman Museum on Maryland's Eastern Shore.

Some JNA members reported that they have visited with Church or other groups on bus tours, and recommended that JNA Leadership consider this for a future activity. For one JNA member, a striking memory of this visit is the welcoming mural of Harriett Tubman reaching out to you to come with her as she conducts you to freedom on the "underground railroad.


# Waterfront

Freedom House Museum, 1315 Duke Street

The Freedom House Museum is what remains of a large complex dedicated to trafficking thousands of Black men, women, and children from 1828 -1861. Slavery, race-based laws, and racial terror erased and diminished African American history and contributions from the national narrative. This Museum honors the lives and experiences of the enslaved and free Black people who lived in and were trafficked through Alexandria

Waterfront cities like Alexandria were also a haven for runaway slaves. Because of the fishing and shipping industries along the Potomac, slaves would sneak to the waterfront in an attempt to board ships and escape to freedom. With the right password, slaves could get taken north. #### **Week 3: Sandy Spring Slavery Museum**



The Sandy Spring Slavery Museum and African Art Gallery was founded in 1988 by Jamaican Americans, Winston A. Anderson, PhD, and his brother. Dr. Anderson, a member of JNA's Advisory Council, is a Biomedical Scientist, Professor of Biology at Howard University, and Community History Preservationist, who grew up in Kingston, Jamaica and moved to the U.S. at the age of seventeen.

Dr. Anderson saw that the history of the black community in Sandy Spring, one of the oldest freed black communities in the WMA, was unrecognized and created the museum to preserve this history to allow future generations to learn about its past. For more information, please visit:

Week 4: Netflix documentary, Descendant, from **Director Margaret Brown** 




JNA closed out Black History Month by encouraging its Members and Friends to view the Netflix documentary descendant. On July 9, 1860, more than 100 captive Africans were brought to the shores of Mobile, Alabama, on a ship named the Clotilda, under cover of darkness. The international slave trade had been made illegal in the US in 1808, but human trafficker Timothy Meaher made a bet that he could get around the law with his ship. Today, the residents of Africatown, just north of Mobile, count the Clotilda survivors among their ancestors.

The new documentary Descendant,

from director Margaret Brown, brings their stories to light as they grapple with a growing spotlight on their community following the discovery of the sunken Clotilda. The film shows how events that unfolded more than a century ago continue to have lasting repercussions several generations later. JNA's Celebration of Caribbean-American Heritage Month






One significant accomplishment was the development of focused outreach to encourage members to renew and to attract new members.
